As usual, the Shaughnessy community was very busy with a number of special school-wide events. Our Terry Fox Run this year was held on Friday, September 14<sup>th</sup> and our community raised over \$400 to help fight cancer. **Shaughnessy Code of Conduct**: At our first school assembly we reviewed our Code of Conduct with students – Act Responsibly, Act Respectfully and Act Safely. Our Code of Conduct can be found in your child's planner and we appreciate you reinforcing the importance of this Code at home.



We will hear a report from Principal, Janet Souther and Vice Principal, Mike Singh.


We will talk about upcoming events at the school, for example the Teachers' Appreciation Dinner on Wednesday, Oct. 24.

### Student Voice - Thoughts about Orange Shirt Day by students in Div. 6 & 7



<u>Katie Ash, Madeleine Ash, and Niki Pantazis</u>: Orange Shirt day is about reconciliation for residential school survivors. We know that residential schools were a mistake that lasted a long time for indigenous children. Imagine having to leave your parents or having your children taken away to school when they were really young.

The Walk for Reconciliation is a walk for us to help residential school survivors heal their past. On Sept. 28 we wear an orange shirt because that was the time when indigenous children were taken from their homes and put in residential

schools. Orange shirt day is also a chance for all of us to come together in the spirit of hope for a better future where every child matters.

<u>Nicole Liu</u>: What is Orange Shirt Day? It started when a young Indigenous girl named Phyllis got her orange shirt taken away at one of the many residential schools a long time ago. The Indigenous children were treated badly and many of them felt that they didn't matter. We now wear orange shirts to tell people that "Everybody does Matter!" Hopefully you will walk for Reconciliation with Shaughnessy Elementary School on Sept. 28th.

<u>Elmena Shuh-Scott</u>: Orange Shirt Day is all about the First Nations and how Canadians took away the children and put them in Residential schools. The First Nations were treated very badly and were not cared about. Today we wear orange shirts to say that every child matters.

<u>Phoebe Liang</u>: Six year old Phyllis was going to go to residential school and she was really excited to go to school. Her granny bought her an orange shirt for her first day of school, but her excitement didn't last long. When she first got to school, the nuns forced her to take off her orange shirt and never gave it back. She felt that she didn't matter. A few years ago, she started orange shirt day to tell us that every child matters.

<u>Seby Hamad:</u> There was a six year old girl named Phyllis Webstad. Her grandma bought her a shiny orange shirt for the first day of school. When she went there she did not think bad things would happen to her. They took her new shirt, they cut her hair, and she was not allowed to speak her language.
